Students learn essential skills in the operation and repair of heavy machinery and heavy-duty diesel trucks using the latest techniques and diagnostic equipment. An experienced classroom instructor and on-site professionals are getting them well-prepared for a potential career in this high-demand industry.




Firefighting and Emergency Medical Technician

This new, two-year Career & Technical Education program is off to a busy start at the Madison County Emergency Management Training Center. Students have the opportunity to earn certifications in Basic Exterior Firefighting Operations (BEFO) and Emergency Medical Technician (EMT)-Basic. The half-day class combines an on-site classroom with access to facilities, rescue equipment and highly dedicated emergency responders.

OCM BOCES & DeRuyter = Student Success



DeRuyter senior Layla Shelby enrolled in the Early Childhood Education program embedded at CAPCO — the Cortland County Community Action Program, Inc. — so she could work in their on-site preschool and see if she liked it. She didn’t just like it — she loved it. Next year, she plans to go to college to pursue a career in the field.

“I think the Early Childhood Education program is great because it gives you a close look at what this field is really about,” she said. “I also love the non-traditional classroom setting.”

Layla and her classmates learn in an on-site classroom from instructor Heather Tuttle and apply this knowledge in a real-world setting through CAPCO’s Head Start program. Students also get a jump-start on college by getting the opportunity to earn dual credits through Tompkins Cortland Community College (TC3). Last year, Layla earned three college credits from TC3 as a junior. This year, she’s on track to earn six more.

Tuttle called Layla “a natural talent” with children.

“Her hard work and dedication are evident every day,” Tuttle said. “She has been a wonderful asset to this program.”

Brittany Burch, one of the CAPCO Head Start teachers, agrees.

“When Layla enters our classroom, the children always gravitate towards her, and she is always warm and receptive,” Burch said. “She never hesitates to jump right into any activity the children are doing. She has a sweet and funny personality that is very welcomed.”

One of Layla’s favorite projects was to design and create three developmentally appropriate math lessons for the preschool children. The lesson incorporated “a lot of theory from class about what is developmentally appropriate, the different ways young children learn, how to interact with young children, different teaching methods and strategies, and how to accept or give feedback,” Tuttle said. “At the end of the day, Layla was able to implement her lesson with the class.”

Another person who applauds Layla’s success is her mother, Sunshine Shelby.

“Having Layla in this program has been absolutely amazing,” Sunshine said. “She is obviously doing remarkable work, and she looks forward to going to class every day.”

Did You Know?

Last spring, the DeRuyter leadership team met with OCM BOCES Instructional Support Services to begin the process of a curriculum review cycle. Looking ahead to this year and beyond, ISS is excited to work with Superintendent Dr. Neal Capone in the audit and needs assessment process with the goal of bringing a Community Schools model to DeRuyter. The Community Schools framework helps districts address the academic, social-emotional, mental health and behavioral needs of students.
