Innovation Tech celebrates 10 years!

When Innovation Tech opened its doors in the fall of 2014, this first-ever “New Tech” school in Central New York broke many of the rules of a traditional high school. Students had no assigned desks. They worked in teams on real-world challenges. Teachers, called “facilitators,” encouraged students to direct their own learning.


With the support of its districts and community partners, OCM BOCES took a chance on Innovation Tech and, two years later, on Seven Valleys New Tech Academy in Cortland. Today, these OCM BOCES “sister” schools continue to meet the needs of students who flourish in small, close-knit settings with a project-based approach to learning.



Building Community

Restorative Practices: Poke your head in almost any OCM BOCES classroom, and you'll probably discover a regular “check-in” circle in which students and staff share their feelings, discuss nearly any topic of interest, and ultimately forge close connections with classmates and teachers. OCM BOCES is committed to using circles and other Restorative Practice techniques to support a positive school culture, maintain healthy relationships, and resolve difficulties.

Therapeutic Crisis Intervention (TCI) is another way OCM BOCES builds community in its Student Services programs. TCI's goal is to create safe, trauma-sensitive environments by training educators to prevent or de-escalate crises therapeutically. TCI also provides students with coping tools to handle stressful situations. School districts can receive TCI training through Cornell University in partnership with OCM BOCES.



Firefighting & EMT program


This two-year Career & Technical Education program gives students access to training facilities, rescue equipment, and the expertise of emergency responders through an on-site classroom at the Madison County Emergency Management Training Center. Students have the opportunity to earn certifications in Basic Exterior Firefighting Operations (BEFO) and Emergency Medical Technician (EMT)-Basic.



Career & Technical Education


Students who earn a Career & Technical Education endorsement on their high school diplomas have met rigorous academic and industry standards that are recognized by employers and colleges across the United States.

He’s progressed socially and academically, follows classroom rules, and has become more adept at observing his environment and using his visual supports “to be learner-ready,” said one of his teaching assistants, Leslie Walker.

also help him participate in small-group instruction. When he completes his academic work, Bentley gets to have a choice about his next activity—and he always picks drawing or writing.

“We are really enjoying Bentley’s creativity!” Crysler said.

Another benefit of the SKATE program is its location. Since the classroom is housed at Minoa Elementary School, Bentley and his OCM BOCES classmates get to interact regularly with their general education peers. Bentley participates in “specials” such as art, music, and physical education. He views his grade-level peers as role models, a strategy that helps him understand and follow along with class activities.

Overall, Bentley positively influences the classroom, Crysler said. She looks forward to seeing him grow.

“Bentley is a very loving and interactive child, and he enjoys affection—a hug, a kind gesture—from his favorite staff members throughout his school day,” she said.

Did You Know?

The East Syracuse Minoa School District boosted its participation in the regional Battle of the Books (BOB) competition, hosted by the School Library System, sending teams from every available grade level. BOB is a competition where students study a specific set of novels over several months.They then compete in “Jeopardy-style” tournaments at various stages, starting at the building level and advancing to district, regional, and super regional competitions. This year, the number of ESM particpantns grew from 145 students to an impressive 201 during the 2023-24 school year. Additionally, the Fremont Elementary School's 1-2 team won at the super regional level.
