### SPOTLIGHT


#### Innovation Tech celebrates 10 years!



When Innovation Tech opened its doors in the fall of 2014, this first-ever “New Tech” school in Central New York broke many of the rules of a traditional high school. Students had no assigned desks. They worked in teams on real-world challenges. Teachers, called “facilitators,” encouraged students to direct their own learning.

With the support of its districts and community partners, OCM BOCES took a chance on Innovation Tech and, two years later, on Seven Valleys New Tech Academy in Cortland. Today, these OCM BOCES “sister” schools continue to meet the needs of students who flourish in small, close-knit settings with a project-based approach to learning.

### Building Community



**Restorative Practices:** Poke your head in almost any OCM BOCES classroom, and you'll probably discover a regular “check-in” circle in which students and staff share their feelings, discuss nearly any topic of interest, and ultimately forge close connections with classmates and teachers. OCM BOCES is committed to using circles and other Restorative Practice techniques to support a positive school culture, maintain healthy relationships, and resolve difficulties.


**Therapeutic Crisis Intervention (TCI)** is another way OCM BOCES builds community in its Student Services programs. TCI's goal is to create safe, trauma-sensitive environments by training educators to prevent or de-escalate crises therapeutically. TCI also provides students with coping tools to handle stressful situations. School districts can receive TCI training through Cornell University in partnership with OCM BOCES.

### Firefighting & EMT program



This two-year Career & Technical Education program gives students access to training facilities, rescue equipment, and the expertise of emergency responders through an on-site classroom at the Madison County Emergency Management Training Center. Students have the opportunity to earn certifications in Basic Exterior Firefighting Operations (BEFO) and Emergency Medical Technician (EMT)-Basic.

### Career & Technical Education




Students who earn a Career & Technical Education endorsement on their high school diplomas have met rigorous academic and industry standards that are recognized by employers and colleges across the United States.

### OCM BOCES & Jamesville-DeWitt = Student Success



Jamesville-DeWitt senior Samaria Ricks always knew she wanted to be a detective, but she had no idea what law enforcement agency would appeal to her

since there are so many options. That’s why she enrolled in the OCM BOCES New Vision Criminal Justice program.

“Why not take a class focused on the whole criminal justice system to learn more about it?” she reasoned.

The New Vision Criminal Justice program is housed at the John H. Mulroy Civic Center in downtown Syracuse, giving students easy access to local courts, police agencies, the district attorney’s office, the county jail, and

other government entities. Leonard J. Nolan III, who had a long career in law enforcement, teaches the class. He routinely brings in guest speakers so students can learn about potential careers.

While each day in the Criminal Justice program looks different, a few things have stood out to Samaria. One is a little-known fact about emergency vehicle sirens, which are only effective as a warning device at short ranges and low speeds. At high speeds, an emergency vehicle can “outrun” its sound and become ineffective to bystanders and other drivers.

On a personal level, Samara has also noticed a change: She’s become much more comfortable speaking in front of large groups because of the projects and presentations they do in class.

Nolan, her teacher, can’t say enough about

Samaria. He says she is a pleasure to have in class and “a joy to have as a student.” Academically, she also performs well, maintaining a 99-percent average for her five-week report.

“Samaria is very active with her peers and shines during debate sessions and group projects,” Nolan said.

After graduation, Samaria hopes to attend college and continue her studies in criminal justice.

She thinks OCM BOCES will prepare her well, and she appreciates the new relationships she has formed with classmates from across the region.

“I think my experience at BOCES is great because of our class dynamic and how we just blend well with each other,” she said.

### Did You Know?

The New York State Seal of Biliteracy honors high school graduates who demonstrate high proficiency in listening, speaking, reading, and writing in one or more languages in addition to English. Jamesville-DeWitt High School awarded Seals of Biliteracy to 18 graduating seniors across seven languages, including Spanish, French, Hindi, Amharic, Chinese, Nepali, and Turkish. Notably, four of these seniors were recognized for earning Seals in two or more languages.
