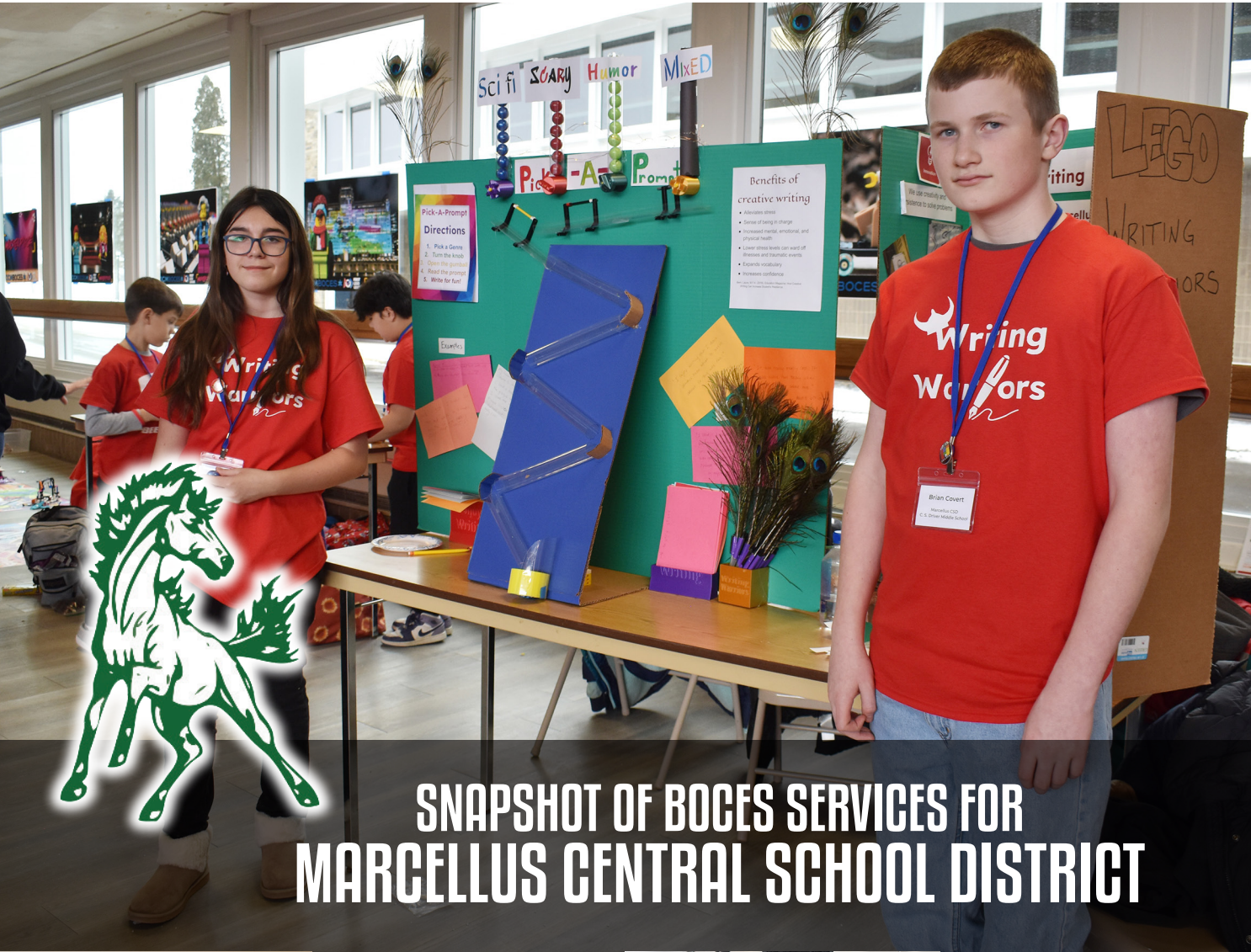

Innovation Tech celebrates 10 years!

When Innovation Tech opened its doors in the fall of 2014, this first-ever “New Tech” school in Central New York broke many of the rules of a traditional high school. Students had no assigned desks. They worked in teams on real-world challenges. Teachers, called “facilitators,” encouraged students to direct their own learning.


With the support of its districts and community partners, OCM BOCES took a chance on Innovation Tech and, two years later, on Seven Valleys New Tech Academy in Cortland. Today, these OCM BOCES “sister” schools continue to meet the needs of students who flourish in small, close-knit settings with a project-based approach to learning.



Building Community

Restorative Practices: Poke your head in almost any OCM BOCES classroom, and you'll probably discover a regular “check-in” circle in which students and staff share their feelings, discuss nearly any topic of interest, and ultimately forge close connections with classmates and teachers. OCM BOCES is committed to using circles and other Restorative Practice techniques to support a positive school culture, maintain healthy relationships, and resolve difficulties.

Therapeutic Crisis Intervention (TCI) is another way OCM BOCES builds community in its Student Services programs. TCI's goal is to create safe, trauma-sensitive environments by training educators to prevent or de-escalate crises therapeutically. TCI also provides students with coping tools to handle stressful situations. School districts can receive TCI training through Cornell University in partnership with OCM BOCES.



Firefighting & EMT program


This two-year Career & Technical Education program gives students access to training facilities, rescue equipment, and the expertise of emergency responders through an on-site classroom at the Madison County Emergency Management Training Center. Students have the opportunity to earn certifications in Basic Exterior Firefighting Operations (BEFO) and Emergency Medical Technician (EMT)-Basic.



Career & Technical Education


Students who earn a Career & Technical Education endorsement on their high school diplomas have met rigorous academic and industry standards that are recognized by employers and colleges across the United States.

OCM BOCES & Marcellus = Student Success



Devan Lucio was interested in pursuing a career in marketing, communications or media, but this outgoing Marcellus junior couldn't put a finger on which career to pursue.

Everything changed once Devan discovered they could study multiple fields through the OCM BOCES Media Marketing Communications (MMC) program, which has a classroom inside the WCNY studios in downtown Syracuse.

Devan splits each school day between Innovation Tech and WCNY's Broadcast and Education Center, where students get opportunities to work with WCNY staff on projects spanning TV, radio, social media, web, and print platforms.

Through this hands-on training, Devan is learning firsthand about the time, effort and techniques that go into each specialty.

“This program is helping me figure out my likes, dislikes, and all the things that can stem from this experience,” Devan said.

Devan has high praise for Innovation Tech, too, calling it a pivotal choice for their high school career because they could make friends and build a social network— relationships that “turned everything around” and made school enjoyable.

“Everyone here is so nice, and you can form connections quickly,” Devan said. “It's just a nice place to be.”

Alex Starr-Baier, a family group facilitator at Innovation Tech, says Devan has excelled academically and thrives in the school's project-based environment.

“Their favorite project was making a rap video about a geological period because it gave them a chance to express their learning in a unique and unorthodox way,” Starr-Baier said. “Devan has been a joy to teach, and I love the way Innovation Tech has harnessed their creativity.”

Facilitator Kayla Cook described Devan as “an exceptional student and wonderful influence on our school culture and community.”

Innovation Tech School Counselor Kayla Beyer agreed, calling Devan a “bright light” in the classroom.

“Their positivity, humor, and kindness is infectious,” Beyer said. “We consider ourselves lucky to have a student like Devan within our walls.”

Did You Know?

The Mentors Across Borders program supports new school librarians in becoming effective educators by connecting them with experienced mentors from other districts. This fosters mutual learning and builds a regional professional network. High School Librarian Kelly Moses has actively participated in the program, mentoring a new librarian and hosting a mentors meeting in her library. As part of their Career & Technical Education class, students also prepared refreshments for the meeting.
