Innovation Tech celebrates 10 years!

When Innovation Tech opened its doors in the fall of 2014, this first-ever “New Tech” school in Central New York broke many of the rules of a traditional high school. Students had no assigned desks. They worked in teams on real-world challenges. Teachers, called “facilitators,” encouraged students to direct their own learning.


With the support of its districts and community partners, OCM BOCES took a chance on Innovation Tech and, two years later, on Seven Valleys New Tech Academy in Cortland. Today, these OCM BOCES “sister” schools continue to meet the needs of students who flourish in small, close-knit settings with a project-based approach to learning.



Building Community

Restorative Practices: Poke your head in almost any OCM BOCES classroom, and you'll probably discover a regular “check-in” circle in which students and staff share their feelings, discuss nearly any topic of interest, and ultimately forge close connections with classmates and teachers. OCM BOCES is committed to using circles and other Restorative Practice techniques to support a positive school culture, maintain healthy relationships, and resolve difficulties.

Therapeutic Crisis Intervention (TCI) is another way OCM BOCES builds community in its Student Services programs. TCI's goal is to create safe, trauma-sensitive environments by training educators to prevent or de-escalate crises therapeutically. TCI also provides students with coping tools to handle stressful situations. School districts can receive TCI training through Cornell University in partnership with OCM BOCES.



Firefighting & EMT program


This two-year Career & Technical Education program gives students access to training facilities, rescue equipment, and the expertise of emergency responders through an on-site classroom at the Madison County Emergency Management Training Center. Students have the opportunity to earn certifications in Basic Exterior Firefighting Operations (BEFO) and Emergency Medical Technician (EMT)-Basic.

OCM BOCES & Tully = Student Success



Tully senior Garrett Hand can identify 30 trees—a skill he learned this year as part of the OCM BOCES New Vision Environmental Science program at OCM BOCES. The classroom is housed at Lime Hollow Nature Center, a Cortland-area woodland with nearly 430 acres of fields, streams, bogs and trails for students to explore.

This year, Garrett and his classmates have been busy. They've bonded at the Cornell Team Leadership Center, picked apples and churned them into fresh cider, hiked to Hoxie Gorge for an overnight camping trip, toured the “TC3 Farm” at Tompkins Cortland Community College, and visited Someday Farm to check out its sawmill for rough-cut lumber, among other activities.

Garrett first heard about the program from a co-worker at Tully Building Supply. That same co-worker attended the program four years ago with the same teacher, Chad DeVoe. The opportunity seemed perfect for Garrett, who loves nature and being outdoors.

“It quickly interested me,” he said. “I signed up for the program to learn new information that wasn’t necessarily taught at my school and to explore career paths I might not have considered.”

DeVoe said the class has been a good fit for Garrett, who “loves investigating nature and identifying trees, mushrooms, and more.”

“He has definitely benefited from being in a small class with like-minded peers,” DeVoe said. “He started out very quiet but has opened up nicely with his classmates.”

Garrett has exceptional artistic skills, which have translated into eye-catching entries in a science journal and a notable wood-cutting project in which Garrett carved a chess piece out of black walnut wood.

“My favorite aspect of BOCES is the ability to learn in different ways,” Garrett said. “I definitely suggest looking into programs at BOCES if you are not sure what you want to do in your future or if you are just trying to do something new.”

Did You Know?

The Tully Central School District trained a staff member as a certified instructor in teen Mental Health First Aid (tMHFA) this past summer and will be the first OCM BOCES district to implement the program this year. tMFA is an evidence-based program delivered to students by certified tMHFA instructors. The program helps students recognize the signs and symptoms of mental health or substance-use challenges in themselves and their peers and teaches them how to access help from a trusted adult.
